

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

"He's no great shakes as a driver, neither," replied the waitress. "He done just run over a bunch of motorcycles on his way out of the lot!"



2nd July Day Ride to Williamstown

The Ride Report – back by special request. It was going to be a twisty ride today, and some of the first part of it was twisty. We had 23 bikes, and 1 pillion, and beautiful crisp winter's morning. Harry turned up on his latest scoot. A brand spanking new Spider. Of course this ensured that he attracted plenty of attention at the start. It wasn't that long ago that he arrived on his new Thruxton, which also gathered crowd. And Rob also gathered a small crowd to admire his new (ex Govt issue) BMW R1200 RT. We had 3 new riders along this morning. Mick from Queensland on his gold Goldwing, Andy on his Yamaha XJR and Roland on his new CBR500R.

We set off across to Mt Osmond where we had our first mob-up. We waited for ages for Trevor to appear. This did not bode well as we had only just started. A quick spurt along the freeway then we headed up to Eagle on the Hill via the old road. Another short run on the freeway and then we went over Mt Lofty, down to Greenhill Road. A sharp left turn into Woods Hill Road which took us through Ashton, along Marble Hill Road, and into Pound Road.

It was here that I stopped for another mob-up on Knotts Hill Road. We waited, and waited, and I decided to leave the group and go back to see what was happening. I found Trevor and Ray coming along Marble Hill Road so I turned back, picked up the group again and we headed off. Turns out one of our new riders was a real 'new' rider, and he was having all sorts of trouble.

By this time we had lost so much time that I decided to go straight to Balhannah for morning tea. I was disappointed that this cut out some more interesting twisty bits. but that's the way it goes sometimes. Anyway we arrived at Balhannah at 1100. During the break I spoke to our new rider and suggested that he get some practise before he comes with us again. He realised that he was holding us up, and decided it was best that he didn't come with us on the second leg.

We left Balhannah back along Greenhill Road, then into Swamp Road, a right turn into Oakwood Road, a short run into Woodside where we turned into Tiers Road. Our run to Williamstown took us via Vickers, Stentiford, Collins Hill, Lobethal, Nuedorf, Mill, Cudlee Creek, Gorge, Gumeracha, Forreston, Checker Hill, South Para, Hill, Forreston (again), and finally Warren Road to the Williamstown Hotel. Yes there were a lot of turns, but we did it all with only 1 mob-up required. While we had some leave us at morning tea, most were still on the ride at the end.

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

- "Well", the kid said, turning to walk away, "just keep on trying to kick start that pig, and it'll come back to yah!"









24th SA Odyssey - All You Need to Know

Ardrossan is a town located on the east coast of the Yorke Peninsula, about 150 kilometres by road from the Adelaide city centre. It is notable for its deepwater shipping port and its towering coastal cliffs of red clay.

The town was largely initiated by wheat farmers and wheat transporters in the late 19th century who needed infrastructure to ship their produce across the Gulf St. Vincent to Port Adelaide. The site was chosen near an old boat landing at Parara. It was named by Governor Fergusson after the Ardrossan seaport in Scotland and it was proclaimed on 5 November 1873.

Ardrossan Jetty

A jetty was constructed in 1878 to accommodate the steamships and windjammers used to ship grain. Today this jetty forms a major attraction to anglers.

The Stump-Jump Plough

Ardrossan is famous as the location of Clarence Smith's factory where he manufactured the Stump-jump plough between 1880 and 1935, one of South Australia's first and most important inventions. One of the old buildings now provides an ideal home for the Museum.

The ingenuity of early settlers was evident when in 1876 the laborious backbreaking work of clearing mallee stumps became a practical proposition with the invention of the 'stump jump plough'.

Invented by R.B and Clarence Smith this invention helped revolutionize the task of reducing the despised mallee scrub. This was also assisted by knocking down and burning the growth of the mallee trees discovered by Charles Mullens at Wasleys, and the improvement of scrub rollers by William Fowler which allowed a team to travel over already rolled scrub.

Ardrossan is known as the home of the stump jump plough and the ingenuity of the Smith Brothers is remembered and showcased at the local Ardrossan and Districts Historical Museum. Open Sundays and Public Holidays from 2.30-4.30pm or by appointment.

During the early 1900s, the town expanded significantly due to income from the surrounding farms.

Mining

After the depression in the 1930s, the town and its businesses were largely stagnant until a large open-cut dolomite mine was opened by the Broken Hill Proprietary Company (BHP) in the 1950s for use in its steel manufacture at Whyalla on the Eyre Peninsula and Port Kembla in New South Wales. A new one kilometre (3,300 ft) long jetty was added and at the same time construction was started with grain storage silos. The new jetty currently services ships loading dolomite and salt from the solar salt pans at Price, approximately 10 km north. There is a great lookout point near the open cut mine.

With mining exploration taking place south of the town, there are great prospects for the town. There is ongoing community liaison.

Tourism

Today, tourism plays a large part in Ardrossan's economy with the town being a popular destination for Adelaide residents on weekends. It is a popular location to catch fish and blue crabs which are abundant during the months of September to April each year. The beach is safe for swimming and the views of the majestic red cliffs are particularly stunning at sunrise.

Register on arrival at the Meals on Wheels Rooms, corner of West Terrace and Second Street, where you will be greeted with coffee, tea and scones. Registration will be open at 2.30 pm Friday and 12-2.00 pm on Saturday.

Meals to be held in the Community Club at the Football Oval, corner of the Maitland Road and West Terrace Friday night: Ardrossan Angels (raise money by catering for The Relay for Life. Their finger food is delicious and plentiful.

Saturday, Sunday and Monday breakfast: The Meraki Sole will be open from 7.30 am for breakfast. This cafe is operated by a young couple in a new business.

Lunches: Meraki Sole and The Coffee House offer a variety of light meals, the is also Ardrossan Bakery offering the usual delicious fare, Four Jays (fish and chips) and The Ardrossan Roadhouse.

Saturday Dinner: Ardrossan Sport and Recreation Centre (tennis, basketball, netball) members will be serving us with a choice of roast (beef or pork) and sticky date pudding or cheesecake for sweets.

Sunday Lunch: Rita and John Molnar will be supplying lunch of fish parcels, mild chili con carne, savoury rice, apple strudel and berry strudel. Rita and John live at Stansbury and is just 57 km south of Ardrossan, on the coast. At \$10, their generosity is appreciated. Drinks will be available.

Sunday Dinner: The Community Club will be serving chicken or beef shasliks, baked potato, salads with brandy snap baskets. or trifle for sweets.

Activities

Grand Parade Saturday morning: Assemble at the RSL, corner of West Terrace and First Street, from where we will proceed down First Street to the parking area on the cliff tops.

Winery tour and tasting: Emoyeni Wines, Bowman Road, Ardrossan. There will be a bus pick up from the caravan parks, the Ardrossan Hotel-Motel and the football oval for \$2 donation.

Theme: The Sea

Street Parade: Bikes, riders and pillions to assemble at the RSL Hall, at the top of First Street at 10.00 am on Saturday. Route is quite simple: down First Street to the end, make a U-turn at the end of the median strip, then back up to the RSL.

Guided Ride Saturday: Lunch stop at Yorketown - Marie's Delights, 23 Warooka Road (main street), Yorketown. They sell everything from sandwiches, etc., pies and plenty for the sweet tooth. All products are made by Marie and her daughter - not to be missed. They also cater for special dietary requirements. They can cater for up to 50 at a time, but I need to let her know how many beforehand. Check Marie's Delights, Yorketown, on the net.

Other things to do in Ardrossan:

Crabbing (bring your nets/rakes is you are in a car).

Fishing and crabbing off the town jetty.

There is a walking trail along the cliff tops that extends from the BHP to Tiddy Widdy.

Want a hit of tennis? The old courts (near Meals on Wheels) are free of charge.

The Museum will be open and it is a real eye-opener. Small charge applies.

The Hospital Op Shop (open Friday and Saturday morning)

The Variety Store has something for everyone (even though you didn't know you needed it).

Raffles/Auctions: There will be a quilt raffle, and an auction of a print of a scene in the local area, by known photographer, Vicki Freer. The proceeds will be donated to worthy children's causes in Ardrossan.

Cheese Scone Roll

2 cups sr flour

½ tsp salt (optional)

1 tbl butter

34 cup milk

250g cheese, grated

Sprinkle with remaining ingredients.

Peter Russell-Clarke Sweet Chilli Sauce

125g fresh red chillies

125g sultanas

4 cloves garlic

2 teaspoons chopped fresh ginger

3/4 cup white vinegar

3/4 cup water

1 1/2 cups white sugar

2 teaspoons salt.

Wash the chillies and snip off the stalks then put them into a blender with the sultanas, peeled garlic, ginger and enough vinegar to be able to make a puree. Put the puree into a saucepan with the water, sugar and salt and the rest of the vinegar. Bring to the boil, stirring from time to time, until the sauce thickens. Let it cool then store in an airtight bottle or jar.

Keeping Fresh Ginger

Freeze peeled ginger.

Grate using a microplane into dishes.

If only keeping for a week, you can cut into mini matchsticks & stir into olive oil in a jar.

Keep in fridge.

9 plums (tinned or fresh).

115g unsalted butter

½ cup caster sugar

2 eggs, separated

1 tbl milk

170g plain flour

1 tsp baking powder

Icing sugar to serve.

- 1. Preheat over to 180 deg C (moderate).
- 2. Grease 20 cm round cake tin.
- 3. Cut plums into halves & drain on paper towels.
- 4. Cream butter & sugar until light and fluffy.
- 5. Beat egg yolks lightly, then add with milk & mix well.
- 6. Sift in the flour & baking powder & fold into egg mix.
- 7. Beat the egg whites in a separate bowl until soft peaks form.
- 8. Fold into mix lightly with a knife.
- 9. Spoon the batter into prepared tin.
- 10. Place plums on top, cut side down.

Simple Chicken Sauce

Use the pan in which you have cooked the chicken.

Splash a little soy sauce in a pan with a little olive oil.

Stir in a good heaped spoon of plain yoghurt.

Warm and serve.

Feeling Warm in Vietnam - Part 2, Halong Bay

Leaving Hanoi, the Cross-generation Trio soldier on. Thao Coates, Leah Wagnitz and Michele Wagnitz. We travelled on a crowded bus for 5 hours for this 165km journey to Halong City - the gateway to Halong Bay.

We have purchased a 3 day tour of this famous and scenic area which is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and popular travel destination. It is on the northern coast of Vietnam near the China border. The bay consists of a dense cluster of 3,000 limestone monolithic islands, each topped with thick jungle vegetation. These limestone karsts and islands in various shapes and sizes, which rise spectacularly from the emerald ocean. Several of the islands are hollow with spectacular caves.

Michele was here in 2009, the marina was small and very crowded for the 500 or so tourist boats that pick up here. Now in 2017 a massive new marina has been built with the surrounding area containing up-market hotels and blocks of apartments. After some deaths a few years ago on dodgy boats, the government have cracked down on the standard of the boats. Also Vietnam is recognising the need to be more professional and aware of safety issues if they are to capture the tourist market.

We have a delicious lunch as we leave the marina and then are shown our room. We sail out into the bay, enjoying the view.



EXTENDABLE MIRRORS

Many businesses use their cars for towing trailers and caravans, and like everything to do with vehicles; there are very specific rules about mirrors. Australian Design Rule 14/02 – Rear Vision Mirrors defines the maximum projection for a side mirror from the side of a vehicle.

Where the lower edge of an exterior mirror is less than 2 metres above the ground when the vehicle is fully loaded, the mirror cannot project more than 250 mm beyond the overall width of the vehicle measured without mirrors. Light vehicles (cars and 4x4's) are generally produced with mirrors that comply with this rule; however, it is not uncommon for drivers that regularly tow wide trailers (caravans/boats) to fit temporary or permanent aftermarket adjustable mirrors.

Once a wider vehicle (trailer) is attached to the towing vehicle, the 'combination of vehicles' becomes one vehicle. Therefore the mirrors on the towing vehicle should not project any wider than 250 mm past the widest part of the 'combination'.

A problem sometimes occurs when the trailer is no longer being towed and the temporary mirror is not removed or the extendable mirror is not collapsed back down. The mirror will now protrude well past the maximum permissible and so becomes a contravention of the light vehicle standards. Because this can be extremely dangerous for pedestrians and cyclists as well as potentially damage other vehicles, drivers could potentially be fined over \$450 and have their vehicle defected, as well as being directed not to drive until the matter is rectified.

A little care can often save a lot of grief.

BULL BARS



Because of Adelaide's semi-rural nature many vehicle owners chose to fit bull bars to their cars. All vehicles manufactured on or after 1 July 2013 with a gross vehicle mass

(GVM) of up to 3.5 tonnes must only be fitted with a bull bar with a profile that follows the contour of the front of the vehicle. The profile of the bull bar should follow that of the vehicle in plan, side and front view, and not extend excessively beyond the side profile of the vehicle.

The bull bar must be designed and fitted so that the safety of the vehicle or occupants i.e. air bag deployment, is not adversely affected. The bar work and any fittings, hooks or attachments must be firmly and securely mounted and supported, and must not constitute a danger to other road users. The bull bar should not have any sharp edges, corners or protrusions and all exposed sections and fittings must be radiused and deburred.

As with all vehicles fitted with bull bars, pedestrian safety is a major concern. Additional fittings such as driving lamp brackets, fishing rod holders or aerial mounting brackets must not protrude above the top or forward of the bull bar. In addition, the bull bar, together with its mountings and any winch or other equipment and fittings, must be taken into account for vehicle dimensions and should not increase the overall width of the vehicle.

Always make sure that the installer writes on your receipt that the bull bar is compliant with the Vehicle Standards.
